Jack Bumsted is a member of the History Department of Simon Fraser University and has edited several books on Canadian history and published a biography of Henry Alline.

Formerly the Dean of Arts at The Royal Military College of Canada and now Professor of Canadian Studies at Mount Allison University, George Stanley has published many books and articles dealing with Canadian history, including *The Birth of Western Canada*, *Louis Riel*, *A Short History of the Canadian Constitution*, *Canada's Soldiers*, and *New France: The Last Phase 1744-1760*.
