

CONTRIBUTORS/COLLABORATEURS

A member of the History Department at the University of Maine at Orono, ROBERT H. BABCOCK is the author of *Gompers in Canada* (University of Toronto Press, 1974). He has recently undertaken several studies of economic development and social change in Portland, Maine and Saint John, New Brunswick.

NAOMI GRIFFITHS is the author of *The Acadians: Creation of a People* (McGraw-Hill Ryerson, 1973) and other studies of Acadian history. She is now Dean of Arts at Carleton University.

JAMES HILLER has published several studies of Newfoundland history and recently coedited *Newfoundland in the Nineteenth and Twentieth Centuries: Essays in Interpretation* (University of Toronto Press, 1980). A former officer of the Newfoundland Historical Society, he is head of the Department of History at Memorial University of Newfoundland. An earlier version of his article was presented to the Atlantic Canada Studies Conference at Dalhousie University in 1980.

PETER NEARY teaches at the University of Western Ontario and writes frequently on Newfoundland history and politics. In addition to *Newfoundland in the Nineteenth and Twentieth Centuries* which he coedited, he has also published *The Political Economy of Newfoundland, 1929-1972* (Copp Clark, 1973).

A former contributor to *Acadiensis*, NOLAN REILLY teaches Canadian history at the University of Winnipeg and is completing a study of the rise and fall of "Busy Amherst", Nova Scotia. Dernièrement professeur à l'Université de Moncton, PIERRE TRÉPANIÉ enseigne à l'Université de Montréal. Il est auteur de plusieurs études sur l'historiographie acadienne parues dans *Les Cahiers de la Société historique acadienne*, la *Revue d'histoire de l'Amérique française*, et autres revues. MURRAY YOUNG teaches African, New Brunswick and British Imperial history at the University of New Brunswick. He is now working on a history of the University of New Brunswick. A member of the History Department at Memorial University of Newfoundland, HUGH TUCK has published several studies of the history of Canadian railway workers. DAVID BREEN teaches the history of western Canada at the University of British Columbia. He is the author of several studies of western development, including most recently an article in the *Canadian Historical Review* on early Canadian oil policy. CARMAN MILLER is a frequent contributor to *Acadiensis* and a member of the History Department at McGill University. Recently a visiting professor at North Staffordshire Polytechnic in England, JOAN MCFARLAND teaches economics at Saint Thomas University. COLIN HOWELL is a member of the History Department and co-ordinator of the Atlantic Canada Studies Programme at Saint Mary's University.
