

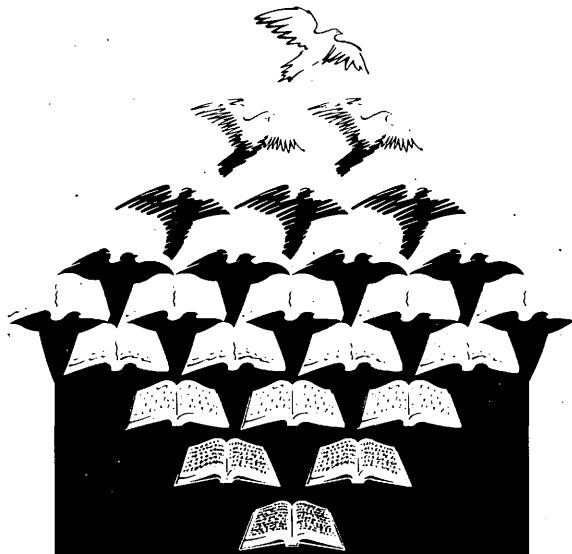
REGIONAL HISTORY AWARDS
