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Following are some additional points to which we should like to draw your attention:

Book reviews are 2-3 typewritten pages; approximately 500-750 words (with no footnotes). Articles and Short Essays are 5-15 typewritten pages; approximately 1500-4500 words.

Spelling, capitalization, and hyphenation are according to Webster.

Quotations should be kept at a minimum. No prose quotations longer than 100 words. No verse quotations longer than two lines. All quotations should be incorporated into the text. All non-English quotations must be translated into English; translators of texts and quotations must be identified.

Footnotes are reserved for bibliographical information (comments and explanations are to be incorporated into the text or dropped altogether). All footnotes should be typed together on one sheet in the form of endnotes.

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
