Recent events have once again focused attention on Latin America. In Colombia, the government is locked in a deadly struggle with *narcotrafficantes*, the powerful organized crime cartels whose power and violence stem from the lucrative cocaine trade. But this is not the first time widespread internal violence has afflicted Colombia. James Zackrison's essay recounts the prolonged period of disorder known as *La Violencia*, in which thousands of Colombians died. He asserts that it was a unique phenomenon which violates all current notions about what constitutes political terrorism.

Major fighting resumed in Nicaragua at the beginning of November, as the 19-month ceasefire between the Sandinistas and the "Contras" broke down in mutual recrimination. Whether the result is the cancellation of forthcoming elections or a renewed effort to disarm, disband and reintegrate the "Contras" remains to be seen. David Snelbecker argues that there are significant constraints on Sandinista freedom of action which limit Nicaragua's threat to American interests in the region. This being the case, he asserts, the United States can and should recast its Central America policy to address the more important issues and problems confronting the region.

Finally, Ernest Evans examines the American Catholic Church's policies on the South African issue. His article shows that the Church has, with the best of motives, articulated a position that is nonetheless fraught with contradictions. Evans asserts that the Church has failed to comprehend the possible unintended and undesirable consequences of its policies.
