Brian Aldridge is a graduate student in the Department of History at the University of New Brunswick. He is presently writing a thesis on US military policy towards indigenous peoples between 1866 and 1902.

Paul K. Clare is Associate Professor of Sociology at the State University of New York at Plattsburgh.
