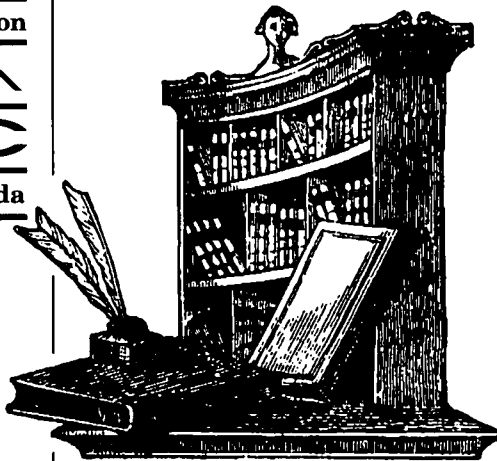
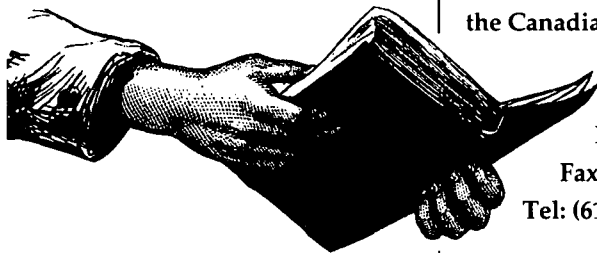

The *Review* is distributed to more than 250 universities, research institutes, museums, and libraries, in 30 countries. It is indexed in *America: History and Life*, *Journal of American History*, *Technology and Culture's* Current Bibliography in the History of Technology, and *Annual Bibliography of Ontario History*. *MHR* is also indexed on the CHIP database, available through the Canadian Heritage Information Network (CHIN).
