Established in 2016, the prize was created in memory of the eminent Canadian literature scholar and former $SCL/\acute{E}LC$ editor Herb Wyile (1961-2016).



This year's winner is Billy Johnson for her essay

"A.B. Walker's *Neith* (1903-04) and the Aesthetic Grammars of Black Modernism in Canada." The value of the prize is \$500. The winning essay is selected based on the quality of the research and writing, the originality of the argument, and the article's potential impact on the field of Canadian literature.
