## REMARKS

Chin Tien. — During the war all the surveying vessels and boats were sunk by the Japanese. Last winter, 1946, the Admiralty detached a gun-boat Chin Tien, of 680 tons, to the Department for hydrographic surveying purposes. The surveying vessel, retaining its original name, has been detailed especially for surveying the channel between Woosung and Kiang-yin section.

Chiao Shan. — In March, 1947, the Admiralty again detached to the Department a gun-boat Chiao Shan, of 216 tons, which has been christened Chiao Shan hydrographic surveying vessel and detached for surveying the channel between Kiukiang and Hankow section. As the vessel was not equipped with a motor-boat on board, the Department detached a motor-boat to be towed by the vessel ready for surveying use.

Tsung Ming. — In November of 1947, a hydrographic surveying vessel named Tsung Ming has again been detached to the Department for surveying the channel between Anking and Kiukiang section. Owing to no equipment of a motor-boat on board, the vessel has to tow a motor-boat ready for surveying use.

Huai Yin. — This vessel belonging to a category of small type transport, built in Tokyo and used by the Japanese especially for plying along Taiwan during the war time, was taken over by the Admiralty on V-j day, and detached to the Department in December, 1946. As its displacement is merely 120 tons, the vessel is therefore designated only for the transportation of the surveying supplies, but sometimes it also performs the surveying duty temporarily in case of one of the vessels being under repairs.
