



### NEW JUDGES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF N. B.

On June 22, 1948, the Rt. Hon. J. L. Ilesley announced the appointment of W. Arthur I. Anglin, K.C., Saint John, and G. F. G. Bridges, K.C., Moncton, as Judges of the King's Bench Division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court.

Mr. Justice Anglin has been prominent in legal, military and civic circles for many years. He was born and educated at Montreal, and later at McGill University, Harvard College and Harvard Law School.

For a time he practised architecture and engineering in Montreal, then he went overseas in the First World War receiving the Military Cross for gallantry at Amiens. In the Second World War he served with the rank of Brigadier being vice-judge advocate-general to the Canadian Army overseas. For his outstanding effort he was awarded the O. B. E. He was named a King's Counsel in 1942.

After the war he was appointed Judge of the Admiralty Court in the New Brunswick Admiralty District and also was appointed chairman of the New Brunswick Board of Public Utilities and the Motor Carrier Board. Mr. Justice Anglin is a member of Gray's Inn, one of the Inns of Court at London, England.

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Mr. Justice Bridges is also prominently known in legal and military circles, and in civic affairs in Moncton.

He graduated in Arts from the University of New Brunswick in 1920 after a distinguished course. He was named Rhodes Scholar for 1919 and received an arts degree from Oxford in 1922 and a law degree in 1923. He was appointed a King's Counsel in 1943.

Mr. Justice Bridges was born in Fredericton and saw service overseas from 1917 to 1919 during the First World War. On his return to Canada he entered upon the practice of law in Moncton, and soon became a leading resident of that city, both in his profession and in civic affairs. He was a member of the Moncton City Council as alderman-at-large in 1936 and 1937, and served as the city's mayor for two terms starting in 1945.
