DEBATING COMMITTEE

Debating as would seem natural at a Law School, forms an important part of our student activities. A debating society has existed in the Law School since the School's formation.

In recent years U. N. B. has built an enviable reputation in inter-collegiate debating but these have been only exhibition debates. The School was not a member of the M. I. D. L. and therefore was not eligible for the Maritime Debating Championship. This fall Gerard LaForest and Ian Mackin represented the Law School at the M. I. D. L. conference held in Sackville. As a result the Law School is now a full-fledged member of the Maritime League.

There are three debates scheduled for the academic year, U. N. B., St. F. X. and Dalhousie being the opposing Universities. An exhibition Co-ed debate is scheduled for the month of January. This will be the first time in the history of the Law School that Co-eds have represented it in an intercollegiate debate.

The Law School and "Up the Hill" had their first intercollegiate debate November 21 at Fredericton. The resolution was "Resolved, That Newfoundland Should Become a Province of Canada." The Law School, represented by Bill Gibbon and Gordon Fairweather upheld the negative of the resolution. U. N. B. won by a two-one vote.

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John Gillis and Dick McKinnon met a debating team from St. F. X. at Saint John on December 9. The Law School upheld the affirmative of the resolution, "Resolved That a Political Union of Canada with the United States Be Accomplished." St. F. X. in supporting the negative won the decision with a two-one vote.
